Course Description:

Instruction in journalism involves a detailed look at the world of media and press. While exploring the realm of politics, the law, and history in the making, this course is designed to sharpen writing and technology skills, to broaden vocabulary, and to develop the skills necessary to become a knowledgeable journalist.
